

## Notice of Environment Act Proposal

Manitoba Conservation and Climate has received a proposal pursuant to The Environment Act regarding the following operation and invites public participation in the review process:

### **CITY OF WINNIPEG – SUMMIT SOIL FABRICATION – FILE: 6088.00**

An Environment Act Proposal has been filed by City of Winnipeg involving a portion of the Class B municipal biosolids produced at the City's North End Water Pollution Control Centre being transferred annually to the Summit Landfill located at 1600 Summit Road in the City of Winnipeg for soil fabrication. Employing the results and experiences of previous related studies and a three-year Summit Soil Fabrication Pilot Project (2018-2020), the proposed activities would involve approximately 35,000 wet tonnes of transferred biosolids being mixed annually at the Summit Landfill site with a carbon source (mainly wood chips) and a mineral source (mainly street sweepings) with the resulting fabricated soil being used for completing the cap system at the site. The Summit Landfill ceased operation in 1998.
