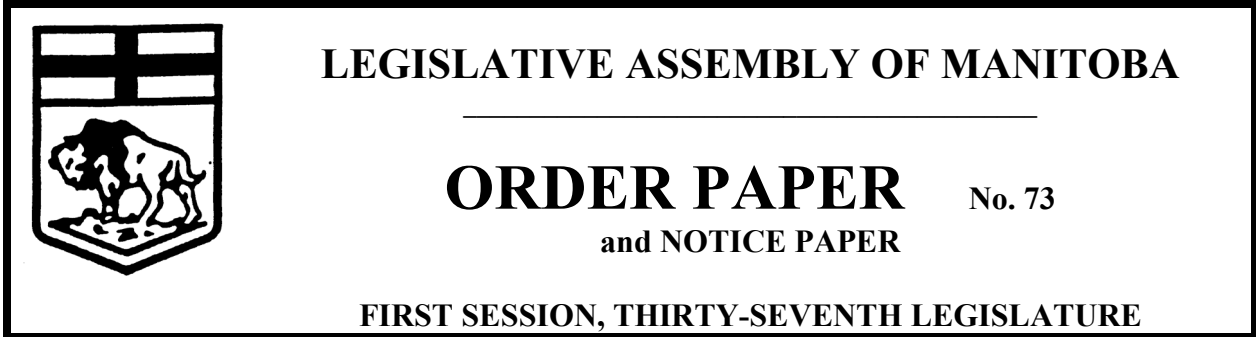

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**DEBATE ON GOVERNMENT MOTION:**

On the Proposed Motion of Hon. Ms. WOWCHUK –

WHEREAS excess rainfall in the fall of 1998 and spring of 1999 resulted in over one million acres of land going unseeded, primarily in the southwest, but also in other areas of the province; and

WHEREAS the federal government has recognized the disaster situation and is compensating people for mould and other property damage under the Disaster Financial Assistance Arrangements (DFAA); and

WHEREAS farmers lost chemical and fertilizer inputs and incurred extra costs to restore their land and for weed control, at the same time as they had no 1999 crop to sell; and

WHEREAS the Manitoba Government has repeatedly requested support from the federal government, which has the lead responsibility for disaster financing, for farmers who sustained damage to their land; and

WHEREAS the Manitoba Government pursued support for compensation under Section 25 of the DFAA, which specifies loss of applied fertilizer and land restoration and was turned down by the federal government; and

WHEREAS the Manitoba Government requested a Canada/Manitoba agreement for the provision of assistance similar to the levels provided in the 1996 Saguenay River Flood, the 1997 Red River Valley Flood and the 1998 Eastern Canada Ice storm, and the federal government has refused; and

WHEREAS there has been all-party cooperation on lobbying the federal government for assistance for Manitoba farmers.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the federal government to reconsider its position on funding for the 1999 flooding which occurred throughout the province, but specifically in the southwest, and include loss of applied fertilizer and land restoration as eligible costs under the DFAA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the federal government to consider programs and assistance similar to that provided for disasters such as the 1996 Saguenay River Flood, the 1997 Red River Valley Flood and the 1998 Eastern Canada ice storm.

And the Proposed Motion of Mr. PITURA in amendment thereto as follows:

*THAT the motion be amended by adding the following after the first "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED" clause:*

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government of Manitoba to acknowledge that the Minister of Finance has indicated that the Fiscal Stabilization Fund should be saved for use during disasters only; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that there is agreement that all sides of this House agree that the 1999 flood constitutes a disaster; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government of Manitoba to now acknowledge that its 2000 budget fails to address the very serious issue of providing any assistance to farmers affected by the 1999 flood; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the Government of Manitoba to consider immediately revisiting the issue of providing assistance to farmers affected by the 1999 flood and consider accessing the Fiscal Stabilization Fund in order to provide the needed disaster relief; and

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**GOVERNMENT MOTIONS:**

Hon. Mr. DOER –

WHEREAS the Manitoba portion of the Hudson Bay Basin is essential to the social, economic and environmental well-being of our Province; and

WHEREAS the Manitoba portion of the Hudson Bay Basin provides potable water for 100,000 Manitobans, employment for 3500 Manitobans in the fishing industry— an industry that generates \$25 million for Manitoba and Canada each year—, a vibrant tourism industry, and a way of life for aboriginal communities; and

WHEREAS the Manitoba portion of the Hudson Bay Basin is critical to sustaining the ecosystems of our Province; and

WHEREAS the State of North Dakota has proposed the construction of an outlet that would divert water out of Devils Lake and into the Sheyenne River and subsequently into the Red River; and

WHEREAS the Province of Manitoba has raised serious concerns about the potential effects of the Devils Lake outlet proposal on water quality in Manitoba including high salt content, possible biota transfer, and possible fish pathogens that could enter the Manitoba portion of the Hudson Bay Basin; and

WHEREAS as recently as 1993, the State of North Dakota was advocating for the construction of an inlet into Devils Lake from the Missouri River Basin and as recently as 1997, the Governor of North Dakota re-iterated his support for an inlet; and

WHEREAS the combination of an inlet and an outlet at Devils Lake would constitute a new version of the Garrison diversion project and would have potentially devastating effects on the Manitoba portion of the Hudson Bay basin.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba oppose the unilateral diversion of water into the Red River by the State of North Dakota either through the Devils Lake outlet proposal or through a reformulated Garrison Diversion proposal; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba call on the governments of the United States and Canada to ensure that there is a complete and comprehensive environmental impact statement on the Devils Lake outlet proposal that includes potential impacts on Canadian waters; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba support the Provincial government in calling for the public release of all studies done to date on the potential impacts of the Devils Lake outlet.

Hon. Ms. MCGIFFORD—

WHEREAS the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) plays a vital and unique role in providing both local and national television coverage across the entire country; and

WHEREAS the legislated mandate of the CBC is to "reflect Canada and its regions to national and regional audiences, while servicing the special needs of those regions"; and

WHEREAS earlier this year, the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC), when renewing the CBC's licenses in light of its mandate, called for the CBC to present a more accurate representation of all the communities of the country by developing more programming produced outside of Toronto including a return to regional weekend newscasts; and

WHEREAS CBC president Robert Rabinovitch has recently confirmed that CBC intends to cancel, with few exceptions, local and regional supper-hour news programs that are produced on a provincial and/or regional basis and move to a Toronto-based newscast with greatly reduced local content; and

WHEREAS this would result in the demise of Manitoba's supper-hour news program "24 Hours"; and

WHEREAS "24 Hours" is an important source of investigative journalism and commentary on current affairs in Manitoba that reaches all areas of the province; and

WHEREAS "24 Hours" has been recognized across Canada and beyond with many awards, including the 1997 Best Newscast Award, at the New York Festival for film and video, largely due to its exceptional reporting of the 1997 Red River Flood; and

WHEREAS CBC television plays an important role in Manitoba as a training ground in the film and television industry and as a showcase for young journalists, producers and entertainers; and

WHEREAS the Legislatures of Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have all passed resolutions calling for the preservation of province-based, newscasts and local programming; and

WHEREAS the House of Commons Heritage Committee recently passed a motion that opposed the dismantling of CBC's existing regional television and called on the federal government to provide adequate funding to the CBC for regional television capacity.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba considers CBC's newscast "24 Hours" to be a valuable asset to the life of our community that contributes in a unique and substantive way to Manitobans' knowledge about, and understanding of our province; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Legislature urge the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to reconsider any plan to eliminate Manitoba's supper-hour newscast "24 Hours"; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Legislature call on the federal government to take whatever steps are necessary to ensure that CBC's local newscasts and programming are maintained in Manitoba.
